#### **Bhagavad Gita's Purpose and Qualifications**

Acharya Tadany discussed the purpose of the first chapter of the Bhagavad Gita, which introduces the problem of samsara and presents it as a disease that needs a solution. He explained that the second goal of the chapter is to bring together the student, Arjuna, and the teacher, Krishna, emphasizing the importance of a qualified teacher and student for successful knowledge transfer. Acharya Tadany also mentioned that Vyāsācārya reviews the qualifications required by both the teacher and the student, highlighting the necessity of their preparation for a successful dialogue.

#### **Mahabharata War: Pandavas vs Kauravas**

Acharya Tadany discussed the context of the Mahabharata war, highlighting the Pandavas and Kauravas' decision to settle their dispute through battle after exhausting non-violent options. He explained the roles of key figures, including Duryodhana, the leader of the Kauravas, and Drona, the common guru to both sides. Duryodhana accused Drishtadyumna, the Pandavas' commander, of being cunning for using the military tactics taught by Drona against him.

#### **Maharathis: Ancient Warrior Legends**





Acharya Tadany discussed the concept of Maharathis in ancient warfare, explaining that they are warriors capable of fighting against large armies single-handedly. He described the qualifications and titles given to soldiers based on their skills and experience, with Maharathis being the most powerful, capable of defeating 11,000 enemy soldiers alone. Acharya Tadany also mentioned various powerful warriors from the Pandava army, including Bhima, Arjuna, and others, emphasizing their strength and courage.

### **Comparing Strengths in Competitive Fields**

Acharya Tadany discussed the concept of comparing strengths and weaknesses in competitive fields, similar to a war, and applied this to Duryodhana's army analysis. He explained the traditional duties of a Brahmana according to Varna Ashrama Dharma, which include performing rituals, studying and teaching the Vedas, and receiving donations. Acharya Tadany emphasized that Drona Acharya, as a Brahmana, violated these duties by teaching warriors, and suggested that modern society has followed suit by embracing such violations.

### **Warrior Roles and Army Strategy**

Acharya Tadany discussed the roles and restrictions of warriors in a war, emphasizing that Drona, as a Brahmana, should not participate in fighting but can teach others. They highlighted the importance of knowing the prominent warriors on their side, including leaders like Drona, and the need to understand their relative strength compared to both armies. Acharya Tadany mentioned that the list of warriors would continue in the next class.
